

CHAPTER 11 FUTURE PERFECT TENSE

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When we use this tense?

- Used to describe an event that has not yet happened but is expected or planned to happen.
- Has two different forms:
 - a) will/shall have done
 - b) be going to have done

FORM Future Perfect with "Will"

[will have + past participle]

Example:

- a) I will have completed my list by the time I *come* back from the mall.
- b) Carlo and Pat shall have finished their list by Monday..

Jeremy and Gabe shall have decided
on what to give up for Lent by
tomorrow.

What are the words in red?

In Green?

Will/shall have

&

time clause

FORM Future Perfect with "Be Going To"

[am/is/are + going to have + past participle]

Example:

- a) You are going to have corrected your correction by this evening.
- b) Are you going to have corrected your correction by this evening.
- c) You are not going to have corrected your correction by this evening.

USE 1

Completed Action Before Something in the Future

The Future Perfect expresses the idea that something will occur before another action in the future.

It can also show that something will happen before a specific time in the future.

USE 1

Completed Action Before Something in the Future

Example:

- a) I am not going to have finished this exercises by 2 o'clock.
- b) Will he have learned enough Chinese to communicate before he moves to Beijing?

USE 2

Duration Before Something in the Future (Non-Continuous Verbs)

With Non-Continuous Verbs and some non-continuous uses of Mixed Verbs, we use the Future Perfect to show that something will continue up until another action in the future.

USE 2

Duration Before Something in the Future (Non-Continuous Verbs)

Examples:

- a) I will have been in Paris for five months by the time I leave.
- b) By Thursday, Mary is going to have my book for a week

REMEMBER

No Future in Time Clauses



Like all future forms, the Future Perfect cannot be used in clauses beginning with time expressions such as : when, while, before, after, by the time, as soon as,if, unless, etc.

But.....



If there's a verb in the time clause, use the present tense

By the time we celebrate the born and life of Rasulullah, everyone will have remembered his sufferings and triumph.

Look



By the time we celebrate the born and life of
Rasulullah

This is the time clause, so, use the
PRESENT TENSE

everyone will have remembered...



promised action, so, future perfect tense

Another Example.....

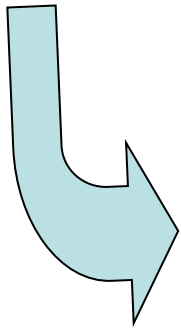


Mr. Barroga will have

Mr. Barroga will have shown a movie about Lent by next week.



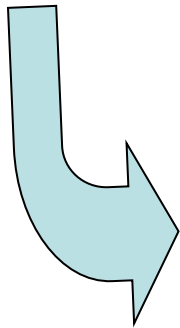
Promised action:
